Small Group Materials, 2 Corinthians 11:16-33

Pray for your time together in God's Word!

Read the passage out loud as a group. Option: Give the group 5 minutes to look at the passage by themselves.

This Week's Passage

Scripture Reference

2 Corinthians 11:16-33
New International Version (NIV)

¹⁶ I repeat: Let no one take me for a fool. But if you do, then tolerate me just as you would a fool, so that I may do a little boasting. ¹⁷ In this self-confident boasting I am not talking as the Lord would, but as a fool. ¹⁸ Since many are boasting in the way the world does, I too will boast. ¹⁹ You gladly put up with fools since you are so wise! ²⁰ In fact, you even put up with anyone who enslaves you or exploits you or takes advantage of you or puts on airs or slaps you in the face. ²¹ To my shame I admit that we were too weak for that!

Whatever anyone else dares to boast about—I am speaking as a fool—I also dare to boast about. ²² Are they Hebrews? So am I. Are they Israelites? So am I. Are they Abraham's descendants? So am I. ²³ Are they servants of Christ? (I am out of my mind to talk like this.) I am more. I have worked much harder, been in prison more frequently, been flogged more severely, and been exposed to death again and again. ²⁴ Five times I received from the Jews the forty lashes minus one. ²⁵ Three times I was beaten with rods, once I was pelted with stones, three times I was shipwrecked, I spent a night and a day in the open sea, ²⁶ I have been constantly on the move. I have been in danger from rivers, in danger from bandits, in danger from my fellow Jews, in danger from Gentiles; in danger in the city, in danger in the country, in danger at sea; and in danger from false believers. ²⁷ I have labored and toiled and have often gone without sleep; I have known hunger and thirst and have often gone without food; I have been cold and naked. ²⁸ Besides everything else, I face daily the pressure of my concern for all the churches. ²⁹Who is weak, and I do not feel weak? Who is led into sin, and I do not inwardly burn?

³⁰ If I must boast, I will boast of the things that show my weakness. ³¹ The God and Father of the Lord Jesus, who is to be praised forever, knows that I am not lying. ³² In Damascus the governor under King Aretas had the city of the Damascenes guarded in order to arrest me. ³³ But I was lowered in a basket from a window in the wall and slipped through his hands.

Discussion

Ask the Group: What about this passage stood out to you?

Leaders' Note: This question gives your group the opportunity to explore their own ideas before leading them to specific discussion. Caution: Do not let this turn into a debate about personal understandings—keep it more on the "observation" level.

Ask the Group: How would you define boasting?

Leaders' Note - from dictionary.com:

- 1) to speak with exaggeration and excessive pride, especially about oneself.
- 2) to be proud in the possession of.

Ask the Group: In vv. 16 - 21, what reason does Paul give for his boasting?

Leaders' Note: Ref. Proverbs 26:5

Possible Answers: to defend his ministry by resorting to the "foolish" behavior of the "super-apostles" that the Corinthians apparently accepted

- **Ask the Group:** What has Paul already boasted about in this letter and how is this different than the false apostles? *Leaders' Note: Ref. 1:12, 9:2, 10:8, 11:10*
- Ask the Group: How is this boasting different from the false apostles? Possible Answers: Paul's boasts were centered on loving the Corinthians whereas the boasts of the false apostles were focused on themselves. In vs. 17 he considers self-confident boasting to be foolish, and in vs. 18 decries "boasting in the way the world does" as foolish.

Ask the Group: In vv. 19 – 21, Paul uses irony; this literary tool seems to come across sarcastically. When do you think it is appropriate to use sarcasm to make a point? *Possible Answers: out of a heart of love, when they did not seem responsive to clear common sense.*

• **Ask the Group:** How do you determine when you've "crossed the line"? *Possible Answer: when your heart changes from trying to help someone to trying to hurt them or make yourself look good (self-focus).*

Ask the Group: Why do the Corinthians (or people in general) put up with the types of leaders described in vv. 19 - 20?

Possible Answer: because they want to be like them and so they don't see the negatives.

- Ask the Group: How do we guard against this foolish influence? Possible Answers: surrounding ourselves with biblical community that "spurs each other on" (Hebrews 3:13), elders who actively seek God, etc.
- **Ask the Group:** What protection does God offer us from foolish influence? *Possible Answers: the Holy Spirit, consistent study of God's Word, etc.*

Ask the Group: In vv. 21b – 29, Paul compares himself and his experiences to these "super apostles," mostly highlighting what people would often consider failures and weaknesses. Why doesn't Paul boast about his accomplishments or successes instead? Possible Answers: Paul considered his weaknesses and shames as most relating to Christ, his weaknesses highlight Christ's strengths. By listing out all weaknesses, Paul proves he's not hiding anything (v. 31).

Ask the Group: In vv. 23 - 33, what different types of hardships and failures does Paul describe?

Leaders' Note: for context of vs. 32-33, see Acts 9:9b-26. Perhaps Paul included this last tidbit of a seemingly cowardly (or at least non-glorifying) escape to further highlight his non-self-confident boasting in his weaknesses and to further back up his statement made in vs. 31 of truth and disclosure.

Possible Answers: beatings, imprisonments, lack of food/clothing/shelter, shipwreck, burning concern for his converts (v. 28-29)

- **Ask the Group:** What does the hardship described in v. 28-29 say about Paul's love for the Corinthians?
 - Possible Answers: his love and concern for their growth in Christ so great that it weighs on him-very much like a parent's love for their child.
- Ask the Group: How can we emulate this love?

Gospel Application

Ask the Group (small or large): Are there times when you think it is acceptable to boast?

- Ask the Group (small or large): Is there something in your life that you need to stop boasting about, in that it does not build up others or glorify Christ?
- Ask the Group (small or large): Is there something in your life that you can or should boast about this week?

Ask the Group (small or large): Who in your life has sacrificed greatly for your spiritual and/or general well-being?

• Ask the Group (small or large): What can you do to thank that person?

Suggestion: Send this application question and challenge out during the week to encourage your group.

<u>Last Week's Application: (Discuss if time)</u>

Ask the Group (small or large): What false messages do you encounter in your life?

• Ask the Group: This week, how can you resist the false messages and remain devoted to Christ?

Ask the Group (small or large): What does it look like for you to stand up for the true gospel?

• **Ask the Group:** How can you stand up for the true gospel this week?
