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*Love never fails. ²⁷During this time some prophets came down from Jerusalem to Antioch. ²⁸One of them, named Agabus, stood up and through the Spirit predicted that a severe famine would spread over the entire Roman world. (This happened during the reign of Claudius.) ²⁹The disciples, each according to his ability, decided to provide help for the brothers living in Judea. ³⁰This they did, sending their gift to the elders by Barnabas and Saul.

The background Galatians 2:9-10

⁹James, Peter and John, those reputed to be pillars, gave me and Barnabas the right hand of fellowship when they recognized the grace given to me. They agreed that we should go to the Gentiles, and they to the Jews. ¹⁰All they asked was that we should continue to remember the poor, the very thing I was eager to do.

The background 1 Corinthians 16:1-4

¹Now about the collection for God's people: Do what I told the Galatian churches to do. ²On the first day of every week, each one of you should set aside a sum of money in keeping with his income, saving it up, so that when I come no collections will have to be made. 3Then, when I arrive, I will give letters of introduction to the men you approve and send them with your gift to Jerusalem. ⁴If it seems advisable for me to go also, they will accompany me.



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"Paul is moving cautiously and does not want to leave the impression that he is giving them orders (1 Cor 7:6, 25; contrast 1 Cor 16:1–2). He is sensitive to any charges that he domineers over their faith (1:24).



He also does not want them giving because of some external compulsion. In his letter to Philemon, he deals with his fellow Christian in the same way and does not command him what to do (Phlm 8, 14). Paul takes the freedom of Christians seriously. They may choose to take part or not. Their participation is purely voluntary (2 Cor 9:5, 7), and voluntary collections depend on the goodwill of the donors. Consequently, Paul does not command but instead invites, encourages, and lays out divine principles gleaned from

Scripture. He hopes that they will respond out of hearts that have been freed by the gospel and fired by God's grace. This does not mean that he sits by passively in wishful anticipation that they will choose the



right thing. He is their spiritual director, and he spends two chapters outlining the reasons why they should participate. He does not want them giving for the wrong reasons. On the other hand, we should not ignore today that the discipline of giving, even for the wrong reasons, may eventually lead to a person giving for the right reasons. But Paul has the highest expectations that the Corinthians will give for the right reasons, and he offers a theological rationale for why they should give."

2 Corinthians 5:21

God made him who had no sin to be sin for us, so that in him we might become the righteousness of God.





1. True giving requires giving of oneself, not just giving money. The gospel is not about what we can get from God but what God has given to us so that we can give of ourselves to others.



2. One can give out of extreme poverty, and one can give out of measureless riches. Those who are disinclined to be generous when they are poor are not likely to become suddenly generous when they are rich.



3. Giving is related to the grace of God experienced in Christ. The recipients are not required to have done anything to merit the gift except to be in need. The givers are made generous because of God's grace working on them, in them, and through them."



Matthew 6:19-21

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Giving by Class:

The two groups in the United States that give the highest percentages of their income are the poor (those making less than \$20,000 per year) and the rich (those making more than \$100,000 per year). Middle-class Americans (those making between \$40,000 and \$100,000 per year) are the smallest percentage givers.

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Few Support the Church:

Only one-third to one-half of U.S. church members financially support their churches.

Pets:

In 2007, it is estimated that Americans will spend over \$40 billion on their pets.

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Giving Not a Priority:

Christians worldwide had personal income totaling more than \$16 trillion in 2007 but gave only 2 percent, or \$370 billion, to Christian causes.

Tithing:

9% of American "born-again" adults tithed in 2004. Then and Now: Giving by North American churchgoers was higher during the Great Depression (3.3 percent of per capita income in 1933) than it was after a half-century of unprecedented prosperity (2.5 percent in 2004).

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Sunday Offerings:

The average amount of money given by a full or confirmed member of a U.S. Christian church in 2004 was \$691.93. This comes to an average of \$13.31 per week.

Enormous Prosperity:

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Incomes Up, Giving Down:

Incomes have gone up nine to 10 times in the last 20 years while giving has gone down about 50 percent.
