27"But to you who are listening I say: Love your enemies, do good to those who hate you, 28bless those who curse you, pray for those who mistreat you. 29If someone slaps you on one cheek, turn to them the other also. If someone takes your coat, do not withhold your shirt from them. 30Give to everyone who asks you, and if anyone takes what belongs to you, do not demand it back. 31Do to others as you would have them do to you. 32"If you love those who love you, what credit is that to you? 





This is the verdict: Light has come into the world, but men loved darkness instead of light because their deeds were evil.

1 John 2:15-17

¹⁵Do not love the world or anything in the world. If anyone loves the world, the love of the Father is not in him. ¹⁶For everything in the world – the cravings of sinful man, the lust of his eyes and the boasting of what he has and does – comes not from the Father but from the world.

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John 3:16

For God so loved the world that he gave his one and only Son, that whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life.

If we wish to understand God's love, we must look at the revolutionary love of Jesus. The Old Testament taught that we must love our neighbors as ourselves (cf. Leviticus 19:18). Indeed, Jesus said that one could fulfill the whole Law if he could just love God with all his heart, and his neighbor as himself (cf. Matthew 22:34–40). But Jesus went even farther, for he not only loved his neighbors as himself, but his enemies as himself. We see this in the Upper Room when, after washing the disciples' feet, he lovingly reached out to Judas, whose heart was set

on murderous betrayal (cf. John 13:18-30).

Jesus began reaching for Judas' soul by quoting Psalm 41:9, "He who shares my bread has lifted up his heel against me" (John 13:18), a reference to Ahithophel who betrayed David and then committed suicide. The reference with its tragic end was meant to draw Judas back, as well as to fortify Jesus' other disciples. Evidently the Savior's voice broke with emotion as he further explained what he meant, because verse 21

records, "After he had said this, Jesus was troubled in spirit and testified, 'I tell you the truth, one of you is going to betray me.'"

Then came the summit of Jesus' attempted rapprochement as amidst the disciples' self-questionings he dipped a morsel of food and gave it to Judas. In the Palestinian culture, to lift a morsel from the table, dip it in the common dish, and then offer it to another was a gesture of special friendship (cf. Ruth 2:14). Jesus' gesture said in effect, "Judas, I know what you are up to.

But here is my friendship. Here is my loving heart.

All you have to do is take it." But poor Judas slammed the door shut. As a consequence, "It was night" (v. 30) — eternal night for Judas' soul.

In that awesome event Jesus dramatized his new law of love—the call to love one's enemies. There had never been anything like it. Jesus capsulized this in the famous "as I have loved you" statement of verse 34: "A new command I give you: Love one another. As I have loved you, so you must love one another." In retrospect, the disciples would see that this love command was explained by Jesus' washing their feet and then reach- ing out to his enemy. This is the church's new law for dealing with eather, and even with one's enemies, which is exactly what Jesus did in the next few hours when he hung on the cross




















The tortures and brutality continued without interruption. When I lost consciousness or became too dazed to give the torturers any further hopes of confession, I would be returned to my cell. There I would lie, untended and half dead, to regain a little strength so they could work on me again. Many died at this stage, but somehow my strength always managed to return. In the ensuing years, in several different prisons, they broke four vertebrae in my back, and many other bones. They carved me in a dozen places. They burned and cut eighteen holes in my body.

When my family and I were ransomed out of Romania and brought to Norway, doctors in Oslo, seeing all this and the scars in my lungs from tuberculosis, declared that my being alive today is a pure miracle! According to their medical books, I should have been dead for years. I know myself that it is a miracle. God is a God of miracles. I believe God performed this wonder so that you could hear my voice crying out on behalf of the Underground Church in persecuted countries. He allowed one to come out alive and cry aloud the message of your suffering, faithful brethren.

A number of us decided to pay the price for the privilege of preaching, so we accepted their [the communists'] terms. It was a deal; we preached and they beat us. We were happy preaching. They were happy beating us, so everyone was happy.
