






Introduction to the Story

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"Rich Man"

- Clothed fine linen
- Purple = Of consequence, royalty, attended by others
 - Feasted sumptuously or made merry
 - Palatial owner
- Self-sufficient, Self-reliant

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"Poor Man"

- "Clothed" in sores
- Of no social benefit, attended to by dogs
- Desired satisfaction from leftover crumbs
 - Laid at the gate
 - A beggar

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

Luke 16:24-25

Luke 16:29-31

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The world's woes are beyond repair by the world's successes: there are just too many failures, and they come too thick and fast for any program, however energetic or well-funded. [The rich man], for all his purple, fine linen and faring sumptuously, dies not one whit less dead than Lazarus. And before he dies, his wealth no more guarantees him health or happiness than it does exemption from death. Therefore when the Gospel is proclaimed, it stays light-years away from reliance on success... KINGDOM,








The Good News of Jesus Christ
