¹⁵ What then? Are we to sin because we are not under law but under grace? By no means! ¹⁶ Do you not know...


Romans 7:7-12

¹³ Did that which is good, then, bring death to me? By no means! It was sin, producing death in me through what is good, in order that sin might be shown to be sin, and through the commandment might become sinful beyond measure.


Romans 7:13-25

¹⁴ For we know that the law is spiritual, but I am of the flesh, sold under sin.

There is a distinction, common throughout evangelical Christianity, that there are three types of people: those who are not Christians; and then two kinds of Christians – spiritual Christians and carnal Christians. This has created quite a bit of confusion and, because of that confusion, we must examine carefully what Paul says, 'But I am unspiritual (carnal, KJV), sold as a slave to sin.' Remember that the apostle is writing after his conversion and yet he is using the present tense. So if we ever have any absolute authority to call someone a carnal Christian it would have to be the apostle Paul, because he declares under the inspiration of the Holy Spirit that he is (in the present tense) carnal. Our conclusion, already indicated in the exegesis of 7:7–12, is that vv. 14–25 describe the situation of an unregenerate person. Specifically, I think that Paul is looking back, from his Christian understanding, to the situation of himself, and other Jews like him, living under the law of Moses.

For I do not do what I want, but I do the very thing I hate. ¹⁶ Now if I do what I do not want, I agree with the law, that it is good. ¹⁷So now it is no longer I who do it, but sin that dwells within me. ¹⁸ For I know that nothing good dwells in me, that is, in my flesh. For I have the desire to do what is right, but not the ability to carry it out. ¹⁹ For I do not do the good I want, but the evil I do not want is what I keep on doing. 20 Now if I do what I do not want, it is no longer I who do it, but sin that dwells within me.
