




















Moses' Birth

Exodus 1:8-10

8 Then a new king, to whom Joseph meant nothing, came to power in Egypt. 9 "Look," he said to his people, "the Israelites have become far too numerous for us. 10 Come, we must deal shrewdly with them or they will become even more numerous and, if war breaks out, will join our enemies, fight against us and leave the country."

Exodus 1:15-19

15 The king of Egypt said to the Hebrew midwives, whose names were Shiphrah and Puah, 16 "When you are helping the Hebrew women during childbirth on the delivery stool, if you see that the baby is a boy, kill him; but if it is a girl, let her live." 17 The midwives, however, feared God and did not do what the king of Egypt had told them to do; they let the boys live. 18 Then the king of Egypt summoned the midwives and asked them, "Why have you done this? Why have you let the boys live?"

19 The midwives answered Pharaoh, "Hebrew women are not like Egyptian women; they are vigorous and give birth before the midwives arrive."

Exodus 2:1-10

Now a man of the tribe of Levi married a Levite woman, 2 and she became pregnant and gave birth to a son. When she saw that he was a fine child, she hid him for three months. 3 But when she could hide him no longer, she got a papyrus basket for him and coated it with tar and pitch. Then she placed the child in it and put it among the reeds along the bank of the Nile. 4 His sister stood at a distance to see what would happen to him.

5 Then Pharaoh's daughter went down to the Nile to bathe, and her attendants were walking along the riverbank. She saw the basket among the reeds and sent her female slave to get it. 6 She opened it and saw the baby. He was crying, and she felt sorry for him. "This is one of the Hebrew babies," she said.

7 Then his sister asked Pharaoh's daughter, "Shall I go and get one of the Hebrew women to nurse the baby for you?"

8 "Yes, go," she answered. So the girl went and got the baby's mother. 9 Pharaoh's daughter said to her, "Take this baby and nurse him for me, and I will pay you." So the woman took the baby and nursed him. 10 When the child grew older, she took him to Pharaoh's daughter and he became her son. She named him Moses, saying, "I drew him out of the water."

"The princess would have had to arrange for someone to breastfeed the child, and Miriam, knowing this, took the initiative and offered to get one of the Hebrew women (2:7). She did not mention that the one she would bring was the child's mother. The princess accepted her offer, and in a delightful mix of God's providence and his humour, arranged to pay Moses' mother to nurse him (2:8-9). Thus Moses would have spent his early formative years with his Hebrew mother, who would have taught him about the Lord and his promises to their ancestors, Abraham, Isaac and Jacob."

Through the Lens of the Christ



Luke 24:25-27

25 He said to them, "How foolish you are, and how slow to believe all that the prophets have spoken! 26 Did not the Messiah have to suffer these things and then enter his glory?" 27 And beginning with Moses and all the Prophets, he explained to them what was said in all the Scriptures concerning himself.

Biblical Typology

A type is a **real** person (Moses), event (Day of Atonement), or thing (Lamb) that **God has ordained** as a predictive pattern or resemblance of Jesus' person and work.



<u>Moses</u>

- Persecuted/nearly killed in his birth
 - Unrecognized by his people
 - Called, equipped, sent by God
- Goes from Royalty to be associated with his people
- Intercedes for his people bringing the plagues
 - Instituted the Passover
- Deliverer who frees God's people from slavery, oppression in Egypt
 - Mediator of the Law Covenant
 - Led people through the Wilderness
 - Moses struck the Rock
 - Prophet
 - Dies outside the Promised Land

<u>Jesus</u>

- Persecuted/nearly killed in his birth
 - Unrecognized by his people
 - Called, equipped, sent by God
- Leaves the royalty of heaven to unite with us, his people
 - Intercedes for the people bearing the plague of God's wrath against sin
 - Is the Lamb slain in the final Passover
 - Deliverer who frees God's people from ultimate slavery and oppression of sin
 - Mediator of the New Covenant (grace)
 - Leads us by the Spirit
 - The Rock who was struck (1 Cor. 10:4)
 - The True Prophet (Deut. 17:18)
- Dies to bring us into the Promised Land

The Disgrace of Christ

Hebrews 11:24-26

24 By faith Moses, when he had grown up, refused to be known as the son of Pharaoh's daughter. 25 He chose to be mistreated along with the people of God rather than to enjoy the fleeting pleasures of sin. 26 He regarded disgrace for the sake of Christ as of greater value than the treasures of Egypt, because he was looking ahead to his reward.

Moses gave up and refused:

- 1. Rank and greatness
- 2. Pleasure-all the pleasures of Egypt
- 3. Riches-all the treasures of Egypt

Moses chose:

- 1. Suffering and affliction
- 2. The company of a despised people
- 3. Reproach and scorn



Hebrews 11:24-26

24 By faith Moses, when he had grown up, refused to be known as the son of Pharaoh's daughter. 25 He chose to be mistreated along with the people of God rather than to enjoy the fleeting pleasures of sin. 26 He regarded disgrace for the sake of Christ as of greater value than the treasures of Egypt, because he was looking ahead to his reward.

Do we give up and refuse?

- 1. Living for rank and greatness
 - 2. Living for our pleasure
 - 3. Living for greater riches

Do we choose?

- 1. Suffering and affliction
- 2. The company of a despised people
 - 3. Reproach and scorn
