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

To to cause someone to have difficulty in understanding or comprehending, *harden, petrify*

...mostly of hearts; make dull/obtuse/blind"

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Paul uses three OT passages to explain the hardening of their hearts. In 11:8, he combines Deuteronomy 29:3-4 and Isaiah 29:10 to demonstrate that the hardening of the heart means deafness, numbness or blindness. The majority of Jews had become insensitive, spiritually drowsy about what God was doing for them and for all of humanity through Christ."

Mark 8:14-21

¹⁴ The disciples had forgotten to bring bread, except for one loaf they had with them in the boat. ¹⁵ "Be careful," Jesus warned them. "Watch out for the yeast of the Pharisees and that of Herod."¹⁶ They discussed this with one another and said, "It is because we have no bread." ¹⁷ Aware of their discussion, Jesus asked them: "Why are you talking about having no bread? Do you still not see or understand? Are your hearts hardened? ¹⁸ Do you have eyes but fail to see, and ears but fail to hear? And don't you remember?


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"Let their table become a snare and a trap, a stumbling block and a retribution for them; ¹⁰ let their eyes be darkened so that they cannot see, and bend their backs forever." Most of the references to deafness [in the Bible] are figurative. Deafness symbolizes spiritual stubbornness or willful refusal to hear and obey the word of God (Jer 5:21; Ezek 12:2) and is caused by sin (Ps 38:13, 18)... Sometimes spiritual deafness is pictured as being imposed by God (Deut 29:4; Is 6:9–10), which is a figurative way of saying that those who continually stop their ears to God's word are confirmed in that state.

Matthew 13:13-15

 ¹³ This is why I speak to them in parables:
 "Though seeing, they do not see; though hearing, they do not hear or understand.

¹⁴ In them is fulfilled the prophecy of Isaiah:
"You will be ever hearing but never understanding; you will be ever seeing but never perceiving.
¹⁵ For this people's heart has become calloused; they hardly hear with their ears, and they have closed their eyes.

²² They came to Bethsaida, and some people brought a blind man and begged Jesus to touch him. ²³ He took the blind man by the hand and led him outside the village. When he had spit on the man's eyes and put his hands on him, Jesus asked, "Do you see anything?"

²⁴ He looked up and said, "I see people; they look like trees walking around."

²⁵ Once more Jesus put his hands on the man's eyes. Then his eyes were opened, his sight was restored, and he saw everything clearly. ²⁶ Jesus sent him home, saying, "Don't even go into^[a] the village."


Mark 8:22-26
