Isaiah, the prophet

Isaiah 1:1

The vision concerning Judah and Jerusalem that Isaiah son of Amoz saw during the reigns of Uzziah, Jotham, Ahaz and Hezekiah, kings of Judah.


Isaiah's 1:10-15

¹⁰Hear the word of the Lord, you rulers of Sodom; listen to the instruction of our God, you people of Gomorrah! ¹¹"The multitude of your sacrifices – what are they to me?" says the Lord. "I have more than enough of burnt offerings, of rams and the fat of fattened animals; I have no pleasure in the blood of bulls and lambs and goats. ¹²When you come to appear before me, who has asked this of you, this trampling of my courts?

Isaiah's mission field

Isaiah's 1:10-15

¹³Stop bringing meaningless offerings! Your incense is detestable to me. New Moons, Sabbaths and convocations – I cannot bear your worthless assemblies. ¹⁴Your New Moon feasts and your appointed festivals I hate with all my being. They have become a burden to me; I am weary of bearing them. ¹⁵When you spread out your hands in prayer, I hide my eyes from you; even when you offer many prayers, I am not listening. Your hands are full of blood!



The opening words of the book explain that this is "the vision of Isaiah the son of Amoz" (1:1)... Isaiah's father was Amoz (Isa. 1:1), but the Bible says nothing more of him. Jewish tradition claims that Amoz was a brother of Amaziah, king of Judah, putting Isaiah into the royal family. It is clear that Isaiah was a married man and a father (7:3; 8:3, 18). He appears to have been a resident of Jerusalem (7:3). Hebrews 11:37 ("they were sawn in two") may allude to the tradition of Isaiah's death under persecution by Manasseh, king of Judah (687–642 b.c)...

The title presents the book as "the vision of Isaiah the son of Amoz" (Isa. 1:1). Israel's prophets were indeed seers (2 Kings 6:15–17; 17:13; Isa. 29:10; 30:10). Isaiah himself "saw the Lord" (6:1), but his visionary insights were made shareable by being put into a written message: "The *word* that Isaiah the son of Amoz saw" (2:1). Isaiah's book is a vision in that it reveals, through symbols and reasoned thought, a God-centered way of seeing and living. It offers everyone the true alternative to the false appearances of this world.

What is a Prophet?


- In the Old Testament, a prophet is a person, either male or female, who functions as God's spokesperson and is commissioned by God to deliver his word, either to individuals or to groups. The prophet receives the word of God through various means, including dreams, visions, and theophanies. In the New Testament, a prophet is one whom God has equipped, alongside apostles, pastors, and teachers, to lead the church through the edification and encouragement of believers.


What time is it?

Isaiah prophesied "in the days of Uzziah, Jotham, Ahaz, and Hezekiah, kings of Judah" (1:1). His call to ministry came "in the year that King Uzziah died" (6:1), around 740 b.c., and he lived long enough to record the death of Sennacherib (37:38), datable to 681.




Northern Kingdom (Isreal) falls to the Assyrians 720BC



A Familiar Pattern of the Raw Gospel

Encounter with God (The Setting)

A Clear Realization of Self (The Problem)

Cleansing/Forgiveness (The Solution)

Response (The Change)

From

"I'M A SINNER"

To

"SEND ME"

A guilty conscience, liberated by grace, unleashes us. The gospel says to us, "That sin most damning to your conscience, that sin haunting your memory – Christ carried it far away to his cross, where it died under God's wrath. Justice has been satisfied. You are released!"

The price we pay for this liberation is traumatic self-discovery before the allholy God. We must be shocked into realizing that we're less Christian than we think we are, more American than we think we are, and unworthy of God. But that's when God comes, to experientialize to our hearts fresh cleansing in Christ. It is his grace alone that awakens us and qualifies us as his voices to our generation.
